

Badminton Regulation Changes – 8 November 2025

Section 2.5 Table of Offences and Penalties

Rationale: To clarify from when the penalty would apply.

3 INSTRUCTIONS TO REFEREES

Rationale: To clarify the current procedure.

3.5.16 Any equipment (rackets / drinks etc) that is required to be passed to players during a match (except intervals as described in Law 16.2) must be given to the Referee and not passed directly to players.

Rationale: To clarify procedure if a new coach or physio wishes to join players on court during an interval when there are already two coaches present.

3.5.17 The maximum number of coaches allowed courtside is two per each side (ITTO 5.4.13, 5.6.7, 5.6.11). If a new coach or a team physio/doctor wishes to join their player(s) on court during an interval, and two coaches are already present on that side, one of the existing coaches must leave the court and its immediate surroundings before a new team official is permitted to come onto court.

Rationale: To clarify procedure and cut down on delays where Doctors are called unnecessarily on court.

3.6.1.1 When called by the Umpire in case of injury or illness, the Referee shall immediately go on court. The Referee shall first speak to the Umpire to be informed of the relevant facts and, if required, call the Tournament Doctor (who should be waiting courtside) shall immediately go on court. The Referee shall first speak to the Umpire to be informed of the relevant facts and to should remind the Umpire to time the delay due to the injury.

Rationale: To give guidance to Referees and clarify procedure.

3.6.1.9 In giving guidance to Umpires in briefings and when called on to court the Referee shall encourage Umpires to exercise flexibility in consideration of players leaving and returning back to the court during an interval (Law 16.5.2) on account of acute sickness or sanitary needs.

5 INSTRUCTIONS TO UMPIRES

Rationale: The instruction regarding when an IRS decision ends the game is not complete and not consistent with the instructions in 5.38.7.1 and 5.8.8.1 where the IRS decision end the game.

5.8.3.3 If there is no LJ or the LJ was unsighted and the IRS decision ends the game, the Umpire shall call: "IN" or "OUT", as appropriate, then call "GAME" followed by the appropriate call as in Instructions 5.6.2, 5.6.3 or 5.6.5.

Rationale: To minimise delay of play and to clarify the procedure.

5.9.1.8 During a match, play shall not be delayed because of external issues (e.g. camera flashes) unless the Umpire / Referee determines this is necessary. Players stopping play because of this may incur penalties for delay of play.

Rationale: To give guidance to Umpires and to clarify the procedure.

5.10.10 The Umpire in consultation with the Referee shall exercise flexibility in consideration of players leaving and returning back to the court during an interval (Law 16.5.2) on account of acute sickness or sanitary needs.

Rationale: To clarify the procedure and safety of players.

5.14.2 For a blood flowing injury, the game should be delayed until the bleeding stops, the wound is suitably dressed, or the Referee advises the Umpire otherwise. Any blood on court – even if dried – should be cleaned up as soon as possible by FOP or local medical staff.

Rationale: To clarify the procedure.

5.10.11 Ensure that changing of shirts by players on-court is undertaken during an interval (Law 16.2) only.

Rationale: To clarify the regulation.

5.15.1 A player's electronic and communication devices ringing on the court or its immediate surroundings or being used on the court by the player for communication during a match shall be considered to be an offence under Law 16.6.4 and shall be dealt with as appropriate under Law 16.7.

7 INSTRUCTIONS TO SERVICE JUDGES

Rationale: To move hand signal for 9.1.2 from 7.2 to 7.4 (correct place).

7.4 Law 9.1.2

"On completion of the backward movement of the server's racket head, any delay in the start of service (Law 9.2) shall be considered to be an undue delay;"

Rationale: To clarify the procedure.

7.7 Where an Instant Review System is in operation, the Service Judge shall check that any challenge is administered correctly by the Umpire, and advise the Umpire before the next rally commences if this is not the case - **if necessary, standing up and crossing the court to the Umpire to ensure the correction.**

Rationale: To clarify the procedure.

7.8 The Service Judge shall back up the Umpire and assist the Umpire as required. The Service Judge shall alert the Umpire immediately upon noticing a potential mistake committed by the Umpire - **if necessary, standing up and crossing the court to the Umpire to ensure the correction.**

Section 4.1.5 Vocabulary

Rationale: According to ITTO 5.17.8.1, if a player is faulted during the interval, the umpire calls '[score], [name of player], [faulted]'. 'Faulted' is currently not in vocabulary.

3.10 ".....[name of player], faulted"

Rationale: Vocabulary for if a player used their communication device (as opposed to mobile phone).

5.29 'You used your communication device'

Section 5.1. General Competitions Regulations

5 JURISDICTION, PLAYER ENTRY REGISTRATION AND PENALTY

Rationale: To provide a more practical framework aligned with the regulation's original intent and clarifies to which players it applies.

5.7.4 Return to Competition

Players who wish to return to competition after deregistration shall:

5.7.4.1 Notice through the Member shall be given to the BWF (technicalevents@bwf.sport) for Players who, at any time in the past five years, were in the Top 200 of the World Ranking in any discipline. Such notice shall be given three months in advance to the BWF.

Rationale: To allow Continental Confederations to play Junior and Individual Continental Championships concurrently.

7.7.3.1 Continental Individual / Junior Individual Championship and Continental Mixed Team / Junior Mixed Team Championship;

7.7.3.2 Continental Individual / Junior Individual Championships and Continental Men's and Women's Team Championship;

7.7.3.3 Continental Mixed Team / Junior Mixed Team Championship and Continental Men's and Women's Team Championship; and

7.7.3.4 Continental Junior Individual and Continental Junior Team Championships

7.7.3.5 Continental Individual Championship and Junior Individual Championship

11 THE DRAW

Rationale: Ensures that any withdrawals that happen during the Team Managers Meeting but after the seeding movement procedure has been completed do not result in a redraw for that specific event.

11.3.1 Moving entries in the main draw to fill positions of seeds who withdraw prior to the end of the team managers' meeting. This applies to the main draw only. Once the Seed Withdrawal Movement procedure has been completed in an event, the Seed Withdrawal Movement procedure will not be used again in that event.

Rationale: Supports what is currently being done by the system in the case of having two players/pairs with the same ranking but seeded in two different seeding groups.

11.6.1 If two entries have the same ranking, their seeding will be determined by drawing lots.

Rationale: This situation occurs where there are multiple players entered with no World Ranking points.

11.7.5 After seeding the draw (Qualifying or Main) based on the World Ranking and Adjusted and Notional Rankings as specified in Section 5.3.3.4 of the BWF Statutes and

there are vacancies in seeded positions, these shall be filled using the order shown in the M & Q until such vacancies are filled.

Rationale: Correction required to threshold number of entries for seeding.

11.8.1 A maximum of 32 seeds if there are 1289 or more entries;

A maximum of 16 seeds if there are 64 to 1278 entries;

A maximum of eight seeds if there are 32 to 63 entries;

A maximum of four seeds if there are 16 to 31 entries;

Two seeds if there are less than 16 entries.

See draw structures in the Technical Diagrams and Tables (BWF Statutes, Section 5.3.8), Table 1-6.

14 WITHDRAWAL FEES

Rationale: Allows for better consistency of withdrawal deadlines for all tournaments across the world. Currently BWF is using the local time where the tournament is played as WDN deadline.

14.1.2 Any withdrawal after 23:59 hours BWF Headquarters time (+08.00 GMT) on the Monday immediately preceding the draw for any reason whatsoever, renders the Member concerned liable to a withdrawal fee, due to the inconvenience caused by the withdrawal, of:

Rationale: To clarify from when the penalty is effective

14.1.3 Where there is a withdrawal of 10 or more Players by one Member after the withdrawal deadline in any given Tournament the penalty as specified in the Table of Offences and Penalties (BWF Statutes, Section 2.5) shall apply. The BWF Disciplinary Committee will consider whether any additional penalty to that listed in Regulation 31 (Penalties) is applicable.

15 PROMOTIONS AND REDRAWS

Rationale: Regulation cross-referencing.

15.1 In Grade 1, 2 and 3 Tournaments except Tournaments with nationally restricted entries, no alterations are permitted to the draw after the draw has been made, except redraws as in Regulation 15.3 or promotions as in Regulation 13 or Seed Withdrawal Movement as in 11.3.

23 LETTERING ON PLAYERS' AND COACHES' CLOTHING

Rationale: To clarify the regulation.

23.2.1 Lettering shall be in capital letters in the Roman alphabet (except as in Regulation 23.6.2), and in one single colour contrasting with that of the shirt unless the back of the shirt has two distinctly different coloured panels, in which case two different

colours should be used to provide contrast.

Rationale: Currently some players have registered a '.' as their last names. Some shirts only have an 'initial' and a '.'.

23.3 Any name of a Player appearing on the back of the shirt must be in accordance with the Summary Sheet for GCR 21 & 23 (BWF Statutes, Section 5.3.7). On Player clothing the Player's name, if used, shall be identical with the name registered as the Last Name (or an abbreviation thereof) in the BWF Player database, and if desired, the initial(s) of the name(s) registered as the First Name in the BWF Player database. Last Name is defined as the family name, surname or similar name under the respective naming protocol of the Member country. Registration of last name must consist of at least two letters and must be in the roman alphabet.

24 ADVERTISING ON PLAYERS' AND COACHES' CLOTHING

Rationale: To clarify how to measure an advertisement if it is on a block of colour to enable to the logo to be seen.

24.2.1 A maximum of one advertisement may appear on each of the following locations; left sleeve, right sleeve, left shoulder, right shoulder, left collar, right collar, right chest, left chest and centre chest. The shoulder is defined as the visible part of the shoulder on the front of the shirt. There must be no more than five advertisements in total and National flags or emblems for the purpose of this regulation count as advertisements. Each advertisement, including National flags or emblems, must be 20 square centimetres or less. The advertisement may be on a contrasting colour which is not considered part of the advertisement unless it is part of a known logo.

25 CLOTHING REGULATIONS FOR UMPIRES WHERE A UNIFORM HAS NOT BEEN PROVIDED

Rationale: To ensure consistency of presentation of Umpires.

25.1.1 If the tournament organiser provides a polo shirt, it is recommended that this should include a pocket.

25.2.1 The umpires are to bring their own uniform: consisting of black pants or skirt, a black collared shirt with pocket, black socks, and black shoes.

25.2.1.1 For men: black formal trousers below the ankle, black polo shirt with a collar, black plain socks above the ankle, and black formal shoes; and

25.2.1.2 For women: black formal skirt or black formal trousers below the ankle, black polo shirt with collar, black plain socks above the ankle or black tights, and black formal low or block heeled shoes.

Section 5.2.1. Major Events Tournament Regulations Table

10.3 BWF CHAMPIONSHIPS

Rationale: To maximise entries in the World Championships.

Seeding and Draw

For any vacancy arising from Seed Withdrawal Movement, Clause 3.2.24 of Section 5.3.3 will come into effect. Any vacancy arising thereafter in any draw will be filled from the reserve list, providing the total number of players / pairs from any one Member in one event does not exceed four.

BWF World Championships Point 14 Substitution

Rationale: This change is to be in line with current practice of ensuring that a full entry size is achieved for all events in the BWF World Championships during the draw ceremony, ensuring that maximum opportunities are given to eligible players/pairs to participate in the BWF World Championships.

After the closing date for entries until **the Sunday** prior to the draw date, a player who has entered may be unable to take part through illness, injury, or other unavoidable cause. That player's place in singles and / or doubles will be taken by the next eligible player / pair as per Section 5.3.9 of the BWF Statutes.

15 ORDER OF PLAY

Rationale: In one tie where a player is selected to play Singles and Doubles and this is the only conflict, no current Order of Play allows for more than one match rest between matches. The below allows for a three-match rest for this scenario.

The following are permissible orders of play:

- Men's Doubles, Women's Singles, Men's Singles, Women's Doubles, Mixed Doubles
 - Men's Singles, Women's Singles, Men's Doubles, Women's Doubles, Mixed Doubles
 - Mixed Doubles, Men's Singles, Men's Doubles, Women's Singles, Women's Doubles

World Men's and Women's Team Championships, World Team Championships, World Junior Team Championships 1.4: Definition (Runners-up)

Rationale: This change is in line with current practice of presenting silver medals to runner-up team and bronze medals to losing semifinalists teams and consequently, there is no bronze medals play-off ties.

10.3 SEEDING AND DRAW

Rationale: To clarify the current practice through additional regulations,

If group play followed by knock out (i.e. 6-16 entries):

- In the group play, the first and second ranked entries from the Member are drawn by lot into separate groups.
- Entries in the same group do not play against each other in the first round of the knock out stage.

- Draws for the knock out stage will be conducted after the completion of the group play stage

The draw for the knock out stage

For age group events with two Groups:

- Winner of Group A shall be placed at position 1
- Winner of Group B shall be placed at position 4
- 2nd position of Group A shall be placed at position 3
- 2nd position of Group B shall be placed at position 2

For age group event with four groups:

- Winner of group A shall be placed at position 1
- Winner of group B shall be placed at position 8
- Winner of group C & D shall be drawn by lot into position 3 or 6

The remaining player/pair shall be drawn by lot into the remaining position of 2,4,5 and 7 on the basis that player/pair in the same group in the group stage do not play against each other in the first round of the knockout stage.

Section 5.2.2 BWF World Tour Regulations

6.5 SEEDING

Rationale: To clarify that eight seeds is only possible in men's singles for Grade 2 levels 4-6 if a draw size of 32.

6.5.2 There shall be up to four seeds according to the GCR in each of the qualifying draws, except the men's singles qualifying draw for Grade 2 – Levels 4-5 6 - (if a draw size of 32), and **Grade 2 – Level 6 Tournaments** which shall have up to eight seeds.

8 BWF WORLD TOUR FINALS

Rationale: To clarify from which ranking a wildcard is determined eligible.

8.2.4 Section 8.2.4 BWF will grant an invitation to reigning World Champions in a non Olympic year, and to the reigning Olympic Champions in the Olympic year, if they do not qualify as of right via the BWF World **Tour** Ranking list, are in the top 20 of the World Tour Rankings on the date of invitation by BWF, and subject to clause 8.2.4 below (maximum Players / pairs from one Member). Where BWF grant such an invitation the number of Player / pairs in the Event will not exceed eight (8).

5.3.2. Time Lines for Tournaments

GRADE 1 – INDIVIDUAL TOURNAMENTS

Rationale: On the first Friday of May, BWF will already have decided whether or not to use the BWF Wild Card and will have informed the relevant Member on this. Hence, we only need to publish once on the third Thursday of May together with all pairs that are eligible in Phase 2.

Section 5.3.3.1 World Ranking System

4 POINTS SYSTEM

Rationale: To align with GCR 30.

4.2.4 had a walkover in the first round and gave a walkover in the second round – they receive second round loser’s points.

Rationale: To clarify what happens if there is a withdrawal: the winning pair who is awarded a walkover win is not then disadvantaged because of the SWM process.

4.2.5 If a draw position which contained a player/pair in the initial draw is left empty after a change as described in BWF Statutes, Section 5.1; General Competition Regulations - Clause 11.3, the remaining player/pair is considered to have a bye.

7 TEAM TOURNAMENTS (CHAMPIONSHIPS) POINT CALCULATION / CONTINENTAL MULTI-SPORTS GAMES TEAM TOURNAMENTS (CHAMPIONSHIPS)

Rationale: To clarify current regulated calculations.

Players / Pairs with World Ranking Points

7.2.1 If a Player / pair win a match, they get their average World Ranking points (calculation of average is shown below) plus the sum of the total ranking World Ranking points/Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points of their opponent(s) divided by 100.

$$\text{Winner Average World Ranking points} + \frac{\text{Opponent's World Ranking/Notional ranking/Adjusted ranking points}}{100}$$

7.2.2 If a Player / pair lose a match, they get their average World Ranking points (calculation of average is shown below).

Pairs with Notional Ranking Points

7.2.3 If a pair with Notional ranking points win a match, they get their Notional ranking points divided by 10, plus the sum of the total World Ranking points/Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points of their opponents divided by 100.

$$\frac{\text{Winner Notional ranking points}}{10} + \frac{\text{Opponent's World Ranking/Notional ranking/Adjusted ranking points}}{100}$$

7.2.4 If a pair with Notional ranking points lose a match, they get their Notional ranking points divided by 10.

Rationale (7.2.5 and 7.2.6): This is a change of the calculation as the purpose of "Adjusted Ranking" is to estimate how many points a pair would have had if they had played the optimal number of tournaments, which is 10. Therefore, their adjusted "average" must be divided by 10 and not by five, six or seven.

Pairs with Adjusted Ranking Points

7.2.5 If a pair with Adjusted ranking points wins a match, they get their Adjusted ranking points **divided by 10**, plus **the sum of** the total World Ranking points/Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points of their opponents divided by 100.

$$\frac{\text{Winner Adjusted ranking points}}{10} + \frac{\text{Opponent's World Ranking/Notional ranking/Adjusted ranking points}}{100}$$

7.2.6 If a pair with Adjusted ranking points lose a match, they get their Adjusted ranking points divided by **10**. **five for pairs who have played between one and five tournaments, or divided by the number of tournaments played in, if six or seven.**

Rationale: To clarify current regulated calculations.

7.2.7 If a Player / pair win a match, but they do not have any World Ranking points / Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points and their opponent(s) have World ranking points / Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points, they get the **average total** World ranking points / Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points of their opponent(s) divided by 100.

7.2.9 If a Player / pair lose a match, but they do not have any World Ranking points/Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points, **and their opponent(s) also do not have any World Ranking points/Notional ranking points/Adjusted ranking points,** they win no points.

Rationale: This is to clarify that the points for FISU University Games Individual Championships are calculated as per the Team Tournament calculation.

7.1.2 Points for the FISU University Games Individual Championships are calculated as specified in clause 7.2.

Rationale: The current regulation does not cover the following situations and which ranking is to be used if:

- **A team tournament is played over one week number only;**
- **There are no Sundays in the tournament;**
- **The team tournament starts on Sunday of week x and finishes on week x +1; and**
- **If the team tournament is played over 2/3 full weeks.**



7.4 Where a Team Tournament takes place over multiple week numbers, For a Team Tournament, the World Ranking points are calculated using the World Ranking week minus one from the final Sunday day of the tournament.

Section 5.3.3.2 World Junior Ranking System

4 POINTS SYSTEM

Rationale: To align with JTR 22.1.

4.2.4 had a walkover in the first round and gave a walkover in the second round – they receive second round loser's points.

Rationale: To align with what happens if there is a WDN: the winning pair who is awarded a walkover win is not then disadvantaged because of a SUB process.

4.2.5 If a draw position which contained a player/pair in the initial draw is left empty after a change as described in BWF Statutes, section 5.2.3: Junior Tournament Regulations – Clause 7.3, the remaining player/pair is considered to have a bye.

8 CRITERIA FOR WORLD JUNIOR RANKING POINTS

Rationale: To clarify that team competitions and FISU individual (for which points are calculated as team tournament) are not included in the BWF Junior Rankings.

8.1 Criteria for World Junior Ranking Tournaments

Tournaments (excluding tournaments where points are calculated as Team Tournaments) concluded within 52-week period complying with the following criteria shall be included in the World Junior Ranking:

Section 5.3.6. Player Commitment Regulations

4 PLAYER INJURY – MEDICAL EXEMPTION AND PROTECTED RANKING

Rationale: To clarify that players can also use Protected Ranking for Grade 2 level 6 tournaments.

4.2.5 upon return have the right to enter into **Grade 2 Levels 1-6 BWF World Tour** Tournaments with the protected ranking points for the same amount of time as they have been absent, subject to a maximum of six months. The protected ranking will not count towards seeding or for any other Tournaments outside the BWF World Tour Tournaments; and



Section 5.3.9. Eligibility and Processing of Entries for World Championships

3 ELIGIBILITY SYSTEM

Rationale: This is to clarify that a Member can have up to three eligible players if ranked 1 to 24 and two eligible players if ranked 1 to 150.

3.2.3 Players / pairs ranked in the World Ranking list for each Event will be considered in turn and are eligible to enter unless a total of Players / pairs, as stated in the table below, from any one Member would thereby be exceeded in that Event.

Para Badminton Regulations Proposal

(Yellow – added text, Red – Text to be deleted)

BWF Statutes, Section 4.1.1.1 – Instructions to BWF Para Badminton Technical Officials

Rationale: A number of para badminton tournaments do not use LiveScore system as it is not mandatory below Grade 2 Level 1 and costly. It is difficult to follow the progress of matches during the day and if the system used is 'Followed By', players constantly have to be in the competition hall to watch the other matches before them so they do not miss out on their match. Scheduling matches with specific time slot in the absence of LiveScore system makes it easier for player to know when they need to get ready for their matches especially when they are playing multiple events.

This regulation will make it mandatory for referees/td to schedule the matches with specific timing especially for the earlier rounds.

Schedule

3.5.17.9 If a tournament does not use LiveScore for its scoring system, competition days with group round matches through to quarter finals (inclusive) must indicate a start time for each match.

3.5.17.9.1 Grade 2, Level 2 & 3

As a recommendation, Grade 2, Level 2 and 3 group round matches can be allocated a 30-35 mins time slot.

3.5.17.11 At Grade 2, Level 1 tournaments, Paralympic events should be scheduled to be played before the non-Paralympic events.

Rationale: To clarify the procedure.

6.7.3 The Umpire shall step down from the chair to shake hands with players belonging to the wheelchair (WH1, WH2) and Short Stature (SH6) class. After shaking hands, the Umpire shall then make their closing announcement from the base of the Umpire Chair.

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5 – Para Badminton General Competition Regulations

Rationale: Grade 2 Level 2 tournaments are a bridge between elite and developing athletes and this is where the greatest number of players compete regularly. A lot of players do not have regular partners while trying to establish themselves on the Circuit.

To ensure there is a healthy level of players competing in each doubles event, we allow for players to find partners onsite. New partnerships could mean players do not always have the same shirt and having very strict regulations at this level related to clothing may deter players from participating which is counterproductive to what we are trying to promote.

22.5 Doubles matches

Each Player in a given pair must wear shirts and shorts (or equivalent articles of clothing) of **the same/ a similar colour** and similar design throughout a match in accordance with the Summary Sheet for PBGCR Clothing Regulations (BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.8). No change of colours is allowed.

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.6 – Regulations for Para Badminton World Championships

*Rationale: There is an increase in the participation of players/pairs in the XD SH6 due to its inclusion in the Paralympic Games. To ensure that more players have a fair chance to compete at the World Championships, the number of pairs is increased to 24 (from 16 currently) for the **BWF Para Badminton World Championships 2028**.*

- 8.3 The Para Badminton World Ranking list of the eligibility data (see clause 8.4.1) shall be used to determine eligibility for the following number of places in each Event:

Rationale: To add new regulations with regards to the number of entries for events with 24 pairs (XD SH6). The regulation states the maximum number of pairs per country and Continental allocations and is consistent with the other event allocations.

9.4 Doubles events with 24 Pairs

- 9.4.1** A Member Association, National Paralympic Committee or organisations recognized by BWF is allowed three (3) pairs for each event if all three are in the top 12 of the latest Para Badminton World Ranking on the closing date of the entries.
- 9.4.2** A continent is allocated a maximum continental quota of 1 pair (to be included within the maximum 24 pairs) for each event should no pair from the continent qualifies automatically by being in the top 24 of the latest Para Badminton World Ranking on the closing date of the entries.
- 9.4.3** If there are still vacancies in the draw after the allocation of pairs based on 9.4.1 and 9.4.2, the BWF will have the authority to add additional pairs to the event up to a maximum of four (4) pairs regardless of whether the pairs are ranked outside the top 12 of the Para badminton World Ranking lists. The Maximum number of players/pairs from a Member Association, NPC, or organisations recognized by the BWF will be four (4).

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.9 – Para Badminton World Rankings

Rationale: To be consistent to badminton, the consequential loss of World Ranking points for country versus country matches is removed.

4. Points System

- 4.4 In the Para Badminton World Championships, Grade 2 Level 1 and Continental Confederation Individual Championships/Continental Multi Sports Games Individual Championships, if a Player / pair withdraws or retires from a match played against a Player / pair from the same Member they will not receive Para Badminton World Ranking points allocated for the knockout rounds of that tournament.

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.9 – Para Badminton World Rankings

Rationale: Currently, where classes are combined due to low entry numbers, some of the more impaired players/pairs are required to play against less impaired players to ensure viability of events.

At Grade 2, Level 1 tournaments, this difference is recognised through a points bonus for the more impaired players to recognise the difference in physical ability, and to ensure event viability.

Level 2 has become an increasingly important level of tournament in the Para Badminton World Circuit and a similar points bonus allocation should be awarded.

Additionally, this would also apply to cases where females have to play against males at Level 2 tournaments due to low entry numbers.

This mechanism promotes and maximizes participation at tournament, ensures viability of event and gives players the motivation to give best efforts.

- 6.8 In Grade 2 Level 1 and 2 Tournaments only, when two classes and/or events are combined, a player/pair that is considered more impaired will receive an additional 550 points for each win against a player/pair considered less impaired.
- 6.9 In Grade 2 Level 2 Tournaments only, when two classes and/or events are combined, a female player/pair that has to play against a male player/pair in a combined event will receive an additional 550 points for each win against a male player/pair. This is also applicable if one pair is a women's doubles pair playing against a mixed doubles pair.

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.9 – Para Badminton World Rankings

Rationale: To provide clearer guidance on points allocation for 'no shows'. Within the current regulations, a player, once in the draw, could not turn up at the tournament, and they would still receive last place World Ranking points within the group round.

- 6.13 No ranking points will be allocated if a player/pair does not show up to the first match of an event and begin a point.

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.10 – Para Badminton World Circuit Regulations

Rationale: To provide further clarity on the M&Q regulations relating to a Grade 2, Level 1 tournament. Players that have not gone through classification and been given the appropriate sport class and status may not register for a tournament.

6.4.1.3 At the entry deadline, players must have been allocated a class (WH1, WH2, SL3, SL4, SU5, SH6) with a 'Confirmed' or Review with a Fixed Review Date (FRD) that is after the last day of the tournament in order to be eligible for the main draw list.

Players who do not meet the criteria of the above regulation will be positioned at the bottom of the M&Q reserve list. If there are more than one player / pair with a similar situation, their position in the M&Q reserve list will follow their world ranking position. If the world ranking position is similar for both players, the position at the bottom of the M&Q reserve list will be determined randomly by the BWF

They may only be promoted to the main **draw** if there are slots available and if they meet the classification requirements.

New players that have not been classified and allocated the appropriate class and status ~~New players without any BWF tournament record and/or without the appropriate classification status~~ may not register for a Level 1 tournament.

BWF Statutes, Section 5.5.10 – Para Badminton World Circuit Regulations

Rationale: To provide further clarity on the regulations relating to promotion. As there is now no Team Managers' Meeting specifically for draws, the Team Manager must attend the Team Manager Meeting only.

6.8 Promotion

At Grade 2 Level 1 tournaments, if there are slots available because of withdrawals, it may be filled by a player/pair from the reserve list until all the slots are filled. Team managers / representative must be present at the Team Managers Meeting ~~for draws~~ and provide confirmation of players/pairs availability to take up the slot.
